Reflections from Our Nation's Capitol 50th National Convention of the American Guild of Organists

July 4 – 8, 2010

The following comments reflect only the events that I attended. As always, you make choices concerning your schedule. There were many other excellent events taking place at the same time.

Monday's opening Convocation at Washington National Cathedral featured the Cathedral Choir and Cathedral Voices, and the Washington Symphonic Brass, organist Scott Dettra and homilist Dr. Thomas Troeger. The organ at the Cathedral is a 4 manual, 189 rank E.M. Skinner. Next Jonathan Biggers, Organ Professor at Binghamton University played at the very lovely National Presbyterian Church. Paul Jacobs, Organ Department Head at Juilliard, played an incredible recital – from memory of course – at Saint Ann Roman Catholic Church. The finals for the Guild's National Competition in Organ Improvisation were held at St. Paul's Parish, K Street. Of interest is that Herbert Buffington from Atlanta

won 2nd place. Following afternoon workshops and a Bach Vesper service, the evening concert occurred at National Cathedral. Scott Dettra performed Barber's *Toccata Festiva* and the Cathedral Choral Society, accompanied by members of the National Gallery Orchestra presented a little known but lovely work, *Mass for the 500th Anniversary of the Death of Joan of Arc*, by Paul Paray. Day one is over, and will be a hard "act to follow".

Tuesday morning took us downtown for an organ recital at Church of the Ascension and Saint Agnes (Episcopal) by Diane Meredith Belcher and a most inspiring Hymn Festival - We Believe In One God - led by Bruce Neswick, director of music at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine in New York. The venue was the beautiful basilica like National City Christian Church, the "cathedral" church for the Disciples of Christ congregation in the U.S. and Canada, and for a long time known as a church of presidents. The E. M. Skinner organ was actually 2 organs – chancel and gallery, 5 manuals with a total of 169 ranks. Tuesday afternoon we travelled to Annapolis where David Higgs, Organ Department Head at Eastman, played a fabulous recital at the impressive U. S. Naval Academy Chapel.

Wednesday morning's events included a Children's Worship Service at Calvary Baptist Church, led by the Children's Chorus of Washington, and a Morning Prayer Service at St. Patrick Roman Catholic Church, the oldest Catholic parish in the Federal city. Afternoon recitals included Isabelle Demers also at St. Patrick's, and Faythe Freese, Organ Professor at the University of Alabama (and our former Dean) who played at Foundry UMC. Faythe's excellent recital included a newly commissioned piece, *Sojourn*, by Craig Phillips which was scored for organ, clarinet, oboe,

French horn, and bassoon. Faythe concluded the recital with the piece that she commissioned and premiered in 2009, *To Call My True Love to My Dance* by Naji Hakim. Wednesday night's event was a Gala Banquet with entertainment by the Capitol Steps, a satire group made up of former Capitol Hill staffers, who have performed for presidents, and on TV and radio stations nationwide.

Thursday morning, 22 year old Nathan Laube, played an electric recital (from memory) at National Presbyterian Church. Nathan, with his brilliant playing, and audience – friendly programs is certainly a rising star among young classical musicians. He is an assistant organist at the Wanamaker Grand Court Organ in Philadelphia and has played in major venues in the U.S. and Europe. The Closing Concert, held at the magnificent Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception, preeminent Marian shrine of the Roman Catholic church in the U.S., featured the Choir of the Basilica, the Washington Chorus, and organists Renee Anne Louprette and internationally renowned organist David Briggs

In addition to all of the above there were numerous workshops each afternoon, the Young Artists and the Improvisation Competitions, and a large ballroom full of exhibits to peruse.

This Convention provided many exceptional, out of the ordinary experiences. The performers were outstanding, making full use of the resources available on enormous pipe organs. Spending time on the bus each day among 2,100 people, no one is a stranger and there is always a connecting thread that ties organists together. I am extremely grateful for the opportunity to be part of this 50th National Convention of the American Guild of Organists.
