Once again, on behalf of the steering committee for the Pipe Organ Encounter Advanced (POEA), I am pleased to give you an update of our progress! Our committee has been processing registrations from students, arranging logistics, and securing funding.

My experience with Pipe Organ Encounters began in the summer of 2009 at Wesleyan College in Macon, Georgia. During the course of the week, I encountered several young organists who have remained friends and colleagues, to this day. While POEs are wonderful outreach programs, POEAs are designed for the serious high-school student studying organ. For the student, this is a wonderful opportunity to interact with others who share the same passion for the organ, as well as a chance for them to connect with professors across the nation.
