### OCTOBER 16 CHAPTER EVENT: CHANGE RINGING AND CARILLON

On Monday, October 16, we will gather at the Cathedral of Saint Paul and First Presbyterian Church (both downtown between 21<sup>st</sup> and 22<sup>nd</sup> Streets North) to hear explanations and demonstrations of the change ringing and carillon arts on the instruments at both churches. The Cathedral’s eight bells were cast and installed by Whitechapel in 2006, while First’s 37-bell Rushton Memorial Carillon was installed by Taylor in 1924 (the oldest carillon in Birmingham and only the third in the country at that time) and expanded by van Bergen in 1961. We will begin at 6 PM with dinner in Saint Paul’s Cathedral Life Center, followed by a brief business meeting. At 7 PM Ted Clark, the Cathedral’s tower captain, will give a brief explanation of the basics of change ringing, after which we will enjoy a demonstration by members of the Cathedral’s ringing band. We will then walk just across 4<sup>th</sup> Avenue to First Presbyterian where we will enjoy a similar explanation and demonstration of their fine carillon. Don’t miss this great meeting that will help us learn about and understand these “downtown treasures.”

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## Mystery Photos ID

Photos one and four are of Vine Street Presbyterian Church on Cotton Avenue in West End. The organ was a 19-rank two manual Möller, op. 3069, from 1921. After the Presbyterian church was dissolved in 1984, the building was sold to another congregation which now has it for sale.

The second photo shows the exterior of the former 21st Avenue ME Church, South, located in North Birmingham. It is unknown if this building had a pipe organ.

The third photo is Elyton-Walker Memorial ME Church, South, located near Arlington Antebellum Home in the western section of Birmingham (Old Elyton). Jane Hardenbergh, Jim Dorroh, et. al, played at this church.

The fifth photo is of the interior of Highlands Methodist Church at Five Points South. It shows the altar and the original Odell organ before the Nave was reconfigured in 1952, adding the chancel along with the present Möller pipe organ. Aleta Brassel was the last organist to play the Odell at Highlands. She was hired in 1948. Amos Hudson was hired as Choirmaster in 1950. Interestingly, Southside Baptist and 11th Avenue Methodist (now demolished; was across the side street from St. Andrew's on Southside) also had Odell pipe organs from the early 1900's. That's three Odells within blocks of each other.
